Evangelism Training for Your Church

From Brad Brittain: The Conference Evangelism Task Force is ready and willing to come to your church to motivate your people to share the good news of Jesus Christ. The training is not really a "program." We do not bring fancy handouts or come with a "cookie cutter" evangelism program. We realize that each church is different with different challenges and opportunities. A big part of our training involves taking a look at the ministries of each particular church and tying those to making invitations to families in your community. We believe that before we can make honest invitations for people to come to our churches, our churches must be involved in meaningful ministries. We ask the following question at each church: "Would you send your church newsletter to Jesus? Would Jesus approve of what your church is doing in building the kingdom of God? The training event lasts approximately 2 hours and is done in such a way that it is entertaining and fun for those involved. By the end of the session, the church will have a general idea of where it is in regards to being an invitational church, as well as ways it can creatively engage people in the life of the church. This program is first and foremost about evangelism, but we have found that church transformation is a byproduct of the evangelism. News Briefs — The Denomination

Bishops Urged to Embrace Change

UM bishops need to transcend the status quo and abandon church structures and practices that are not working, Bishop Larry M. Goodpaster said Nov. 2 in his presidential address to the Council of Bishops. “By our decisions and actions this week in Panama, we will either lean into the future or content ourselves with more of the same,” Goodpaster told the crowd of more than 80 active and retired bishops from around the global church. “Many of us are convinced that what we have in place will work if we try harder, give more or change a few of the players. That’s a recipe for further decline.”

On Nov. 3-4, the council discussed the recommendations in the Call to Action Steering Team report, which recommends widespread reforms in the church from consolidating general church agencies to holding bishops and clergy accountable for church growth. Some of the suggested changes require legislation at General Conference, the church’s top lawmaking body, which will

next meet in 2012. But bishops can begin now by leading the charge in helping the church discern a better future, Goodpaster said.

Ethnic Young Adult Summer Internship

The deadline to apply for 2011 Ethnic Young Adult (EYA) Summer Internship in Washington, D.C., is Jan. 10. The EYA program is for persons, ages 18-22, who have an interest in exploring issues of public policy, social justice advocacy and social change. Sponsored by the General Board of Church & Society (GBCS), the nine-week summer internship program is for young adults representing the five ethnic minority caucuses of the UMC: Native Americans, Pacific-Islanders, Hispanic/Latinos, African Americans and Asian Americans. Interns will work in social justice placements in the U.S. capital from May 28 to July 31. Interns will live in Christian community. Work placements will be supplemented by evening intern-led devotions, Friday seminars on topics of social justice concern, area field trips, and Sunday worship in area UM churches. Participants must commit to being present at these activities. Applicants must be in good academic standing at their college or university, demonstrate evidence of their concern for social justice through extracurricular activity, academic study and have some history of involvement in their church and/or community. Court Upholds Pastor's Right to Accept Members

A UM pastor has the right to determine local church membership, even if the decision is based on whether the potential member is gay or lesbian. Annual conferences cannot limit that right or ask the church's top court to set policy, the UM Judicial Council ruled during its Oct. 27-30 meeting. "The General Conference is the only body authorized and able to resolve the issue for the Church," wrote Jon R. Gray in a concurring opinion on one of the October cases. The General Conference is the denomination's top legislative body and meets every four years. The council declined several requests to revisit a decision allowing a pastor to bar a gay man from joining his congregation. In one case, the denomination's top court ruled that the Northern Illinois Annual Conference did not have the authority to interpret constitutional language to prohibit pastors from denying membership based on a person's sexual identity. Congo Bishop to Receive Peace Award

UM Bishop Nkulu Ntanda Ntamba of the Democratic Republic of Congo and an occasional visitor in the Central Texas Conference, will receive the 2010 Peacemaker in Action award from the Tanenbaum organization during a Nov. 11 reception in New York. He also will speak about his efforts to build sustainable peace in his country's Katanga province. The bishop has helped reduce the recruitment of child soldiers by organizing care for street children, assisted internally displaced persons, created an agricultural training center and built brick churches (many funded by CTC congregations) as a physical sign of permanence and commitment. Tanenbaum is a secular organization that promotes interreligious understanding.

Military Chaplains Ask If Church Cares

Women and men have answered the call to ordained ministry in the UMC, and have further answered the call to serve as military chaplains, to care as shepherds for military personnel in sometimes very difficult places. Adam Hamilton Films Onsite Study on Birth of Christ

Adam Hamilton, author of the best selling *24 Hours that Changed the World* and pastor of UMC of the Resurrection in Leawood, Kan., is working with archaeologist Avner Goren to retrace the story of the annunciation and birth of Jesus, starting at Nazareth and then traveling through the hill country of Judea to Bethlehem. In Israel, Hamilton is filming an on-site study and developing material for an Advent 2011 project, a follow-up to *24 Hours*. Goren, known for his role in Bruce Feiler's PBS *Walking the Bible* series in 2005, is an experienced Israel archaeologist. Hamilton will spend nine days in the Holy Land with Goren and archaeologists from Bethlehem Bible College retracing the journey of Mary and Joseph from Nazareth to Bethlehem. To capture what the journey was like, Hamilton and team will interview shepherds who still keep watch over flocks on the hillsides of Bethlehem and visit first century homes and ancient stretches of the Roman Road that Mary and Joseph likely walked. The team's trip will end with a three-day backpack hike of the "Jesus Trail" along the mountainside and lakeshore in Galilee.

Music as ministry of healing: Nearly every one of us can recall a song that made us stop for a minute and listen with a smile. **United Methodist Student Day** scholarship recipient Maria Payne considers it her calling to create those moments for the people who need them the most. Growing up in a family of five in Aberdeen, Md., Maria was active in Grace UMC. Behind the walls of Grace, her interest in music began as she played guitar and piano for her church. "I might have never gotten involved in music without my church," she commented. That early interest in music

followed Maria to college. She did not want to play solely for entertainment. Maria sought to use her music to serve others. Then she learned about Shenandoah University in Winchester, Va. A UM-affiliated school, Shenandoah offers a music therapy program. "Music therapy," Maria noted, "is using music to inspire a positive response from persons with a particular need. Most therapists specialize in helping the elderly, the sick, and the physically or developmentally handicapped. Music can lower stress, raise spirits or encourage action." When Maria was applying to college, her mother knew what to do, having sent two children to college. She told her daughter to apply for a scholarship through the UM General Board of Higher Education & Ministry. Sure enough, Maria received support from the UMC to help her pay for college, something for which she is grateful. "College is really expensive. It's wonderful that the church supports good kids who want to do well in life," said Maria.

This sexual ethics event will provide opportunities for conference leaders to share best practices, discuss emerging issues, and network across the denomination. Workshops will provide understanding, skill building and grounding for participants to clarify their roles and to coordinate their efforts with others as the church addresses problems of sexual abuse and misconduct. Workshops are divided into five categories, each with several sessions to choose from: Prevention, Cyber Safety, Response to Sexual Misconduct, Legal Issues, and Sexuality and Social Justice. "Do No Harm" is for annual conference response teams, and others who coordinate ministries related to sexual ethics and boundaries in ministerial relationships.
