Alignment Proposal Goes Live This Sunday

At 3 p.m. this Sunday, Oct. 24, Bishop Mike Lowry and members of the Alignment Task Force will conduct a **live-streamed event** from the TV studio at Fort Worth First UMC that will be accessible on the conference website. The subject is *The Exodus Project: A Transformational Roadmap for a Church in Transition*, which is available on the conference website (www.ctcumc.org) in 3 places (main feature, News and Alignment Blog).

"If you have questions or comments you would like addressed during this live streaming here is your opportunity," states Alignment Task Force Chair Mike Ramsdell. "We have created a special email address for the Q&A for the day of the streaming as well as leading up to it." The task force will present the proposal and address any emailed questions and comments. Evangelism Training for Your Church

From Brad Brittain: The Conference Evangelism Task Force is ready and willing to come to your church to motivate your people to share the good news of Jesus Christ. The training is not really a "program." We do not bring fancy handouts or come with a "cookie cutter" evangelism program. We realize that each church is different with different challenges and opportunities. A big part of our training involves taking a look at the ministries of each particular church and tying those to making invitations to families in your community. We believe that before we can make honest invitations for people to come to our churches, our churches must be involved in meaningful ministries. We ask the following question at each church: "Would you send your church newsletter to Jesus? Would Jesus approve of what your church is doing in building the kingdom of God? The training event lasts approximately 2 hours and is done in such a way that it is entertaining and fun for those involved. By the end of the session, the church will have a

general idea of where it is in regards to being an invitational church, as well as ways it can creatively engage people in the life of the church. This program is first and foremost about evangelism, but we have found that church transformation is a byproduct of the evangelism. Joel Robbins (pastor at Ovilla UMC) and Brad Brittain (pastor at Mexia First) enjoy conducting the events and would love to come to your church! Voice of faith crucial to young gays

At age 23, the pain of believing that God didn't love him because he was gay was too much for “George.” He decided to commit suicide. But at the darkest time of his life, he felt overwhelmed by a loving divine presence and he clearly heard in his head the words “Don't do it.” Listening to that voice saved his life. And, closer to home, at the Oct. 12 Fort Worth City Council meeting, Councilman Joel Burns made a very personal statement to the community and especially teens who are gay or just different. From his own near death experience, he urged teens to endure the abuse and bullying and that in time “it gets better.” His moving statement on YouTube has had about 1.7 million hits so far <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ax96cghOnY4>.

SMU Promotes Alyce McKenzie & Bruce Marshall to Endowed Chairs

A spokesperson for Southern Methodist University has announced that Dr. Alyce McKenzie, an outstanding scholar and teacher who is also an ordained minister in the UMC, will be promoted to an endowed faculty position in the coming academic year. McKenzie (<http://www.smu.edu/Perkins/FacultyAcademics/DirectoryList/McKenzie.aspx>), who is currently Professor of Homiletics in Perkins School of Theology at SMU, will be named to the *George W. and Nell Ayers LeVan Endowed Chair of Preaching and Worship* at Perkins. The appointment will become effective in June 2011, following the retirement of the current LeVan Chair, Professor Marjorie Procter-Smith (<http://www.smu.edu/Perkins/FacultyAcademics/DirectoryList/Procter-Smith.aspx>).

Dr. Bruce Marshall (<http://www.smu.edu/Perkins/FacultyAcademics/DirectoryList/Marshall.aspx>), an internationally known faculty member at the university will be promoted to an endowed faculty position in the coming year. He is currently Professor of Historical Theology in Perkins School of Theology at SMU, and will be appointed to the *Edward and Emma Lehman Chair in Christian Doctrine* at Perkins. The appointment will become effective in June 2011, following the retirement of the current Lehman Chair holder, Professor Charles M. Wood (<http://www.smu.edu/Perkins/FacultyAcademics/DirectoryList/Wood.aspx>).

Celebrate United Methodist Student Day

United Methodist Student Day, one of the 6 church-wide Special Sundays of the denomination, furnishes scholarships and loans for students attending UM-related and other accredited colleges and universities. **United Methodist Student Day** is celebrated the last Sunday of November. More than 9,000 students applied for UM scholarships in 2009. However, due to the lack of funds, all students were not able to receive scholarships. 90% of Student Day collections go to GBHEM's scholarship programs, while 10% is for student loans. Each UM-related colleges get money from the offering for scholarships, and each participating annual conference gets 10% of Student Day receipts to award to their own merit scholars. **Two Central Texas Conference students received scholarships in 2010. Eligibility is restricted to only those congregations that participate in the Student Day Offering. In past years, some CTC students applying for scholarships were ineligible because their churches did not participate.**

"Do No Harm 2011," a UM summit addressing prevention of and response to abuse, misconduct and harassment of a sexual nature, particularly by persons in ministerial roles, will be Jan. 26-29 at First UMC Houston. This sexual ethics event will provide opportunities for conference leaders to share best practices, discuss emerging issues, and network across the denomination. Workshops will provide understanding, skill building and grounding for participants to clarify their roles and to coordinate their efforts with others as the church addresses problems of sexual abuse and misconduct. Workshops are divided into five categories, each with several sessions to choose from: Prevention, Cyber Safety, Response to Sexual Misconduct, Legal Issues, and Sexuality and Social Justice. "Do No Harm" is for annual conference response teams, and others who coordinate ministries related to sexual ethics and boundaries in ministerial relationships. At least two persons from each annual conference are expected to attend. Conference leaders endeavoring to start or invigorate a Response Team or Safe Sanctuaries Team are especially encouraged to attend. The event can accommodate 250 registered attendees.
